PE and Sports Premium Review 2016



PE and Sports Premium received: £8,850

Based on 156 eligible pupils

The school identifies the following priorities to impact on pupil standards:

- Continue to increase the quality of teaching in Physical Education by employing a sports apprentice
- Continue to raise participation in extra-curricular clubs, especially for boys, by increasing the range of activities.
- Increase participation in inter-school competitions by funding transport and increasing interest through extra-curricular clubs/coaching.
- Ensure all KS2 children swim throughout the year.

Quality First teaching	£1,450	Employ Sports Apprentice to support and lead PE sessions giving additional expertise to lessons	Sports Apprentice knowledge of skills progression has helped the children to develop better techniques in games aspects of PE.
Increase participation in extra-curricular sport and physical activity	£2,000	Continued lunchtime dance and cheerleading clubs lead by qualified coach and funded afterschool clubs to raise participation	Participation in lunchtime clubs has remained high (52%). Conclusion

Continuing to use the premium to pay for sports coaches has maintained the high level of achievement in dance and gymnastics aspects of PE. In addition to this, introducing a Sports Apprentice has increased pupil enthusiasm for games based aspects of PE and has started to impact on their achievement and skills progression in these areas. Pupil behaviour in these lessons has also improved, and this has been supported by Sports Person and Sports Class of the week awards. Participation in and enthusiasm for extra-curricular clubs has increased and there has been an increase in the amount of boys attending these clubs. Participation in sports competitions this year has been difficult due to the structure of competitions (mixed teams of year 5 and 6 children) and so the school hasn't been able to take part in as many as last year. This shouldn't be an issue in the next academic year with the school retaining year 6 children and this should be an area (travel to competitions) for some spending of the premium in the next academic year.

- Continue to subsidise Swimming lessons
- Funding for travel to competitions
